



What Are You Doing Here?

How can we be more open to God, the gardener, of our soul? There is an ancient story about a prophet named Elijah. Elijah lived in a time when the King and Queen were leading the people astray from the relationship with God. Imagine a world where the leaders don't act in the best interest of the people! I sense that wasn't too difficult given the headlines today. There is a story in 1 Kings 18-19, about Elijah facing down priests who worshipped the god of Baal, which was the religion of the Queen of Israel at that time. Notice that religious tension and differences is a tale as old as time. Elijah wins by having God bring fire before Baal even sends a spark. You would think Elijah would be elated - rather he is afraid because the Queen is not happy, so she puts a price on Elijah's head. Elijah runs away so fast he leaves skid marks in the sand to get out of Dodge and flees to the wilderness for safety and shelter out of fear.

Out in the wilderness, Elijah takes shelter under a tree where an angel makes him breakfast. Elijah goes and hides in a cave. Elijah tells himself, "It would be better if I was dead." Notice the tension? God provides, Elijah pouts. God offers nourishment, Elijah only sees the broken and bad.

There is a story Elijah is telling himself here!

Then, the ancient writers say this, "Go, stand on the mountain at attention before God. God will pass by." A hurricane wind ripped through the mountains and shattered the rocks before God, but God wasn't to be found in the wind; after the wind an earthquake, but God wasn't in the earthquake; and after the earthquake fire, but God wasn't in the fire; and after the fire, a gentle and quiet whisper. When Elijah heard the quiet voice, he muffled his face with his great cloak, went to the mouth of the cave, and stood there. A quiet voice asked, "So Elijah, now tell me, what are you doing here?" (1 Kings 19:11-13). Feel free to go read the entire story. It's okay. I'll wait.

A quiet voice is how God speaks and sings. Or your Bible might have the translation, "A still small voice". Amid the cacophony and chaos and constant 24-hour-news-cycle and dinging of our phones with "alerts" is the still small voice of the Sacred. Not in the whirlwind of worries, but in the question, "What are you doing here?"

That's a holy question. How would you answer, "What are you doing here? You can answer that question with all that is filling your calendar, all that you are catching in the net of your life, all that is filling your days. Or you can answer, "What are you doing here," on a deeper level. Am I am trying to live from a grounded place of grace and let the light of love shine through? Am I seeking to practice laughter's healing

art with as many people as I can? Am I seeking to live from a place where life is an adventure? Like all adventures there will be unexpected exit ramps and people will say things that hurt - but there is also a generous and gracious and generative God that is at work in the world too.

What are you doing here? You have a response to that which is impacting the story you tell yourself. And God is seeking to help co-author your response to that question. May you take time to listen, lean in, and learn from the One who comes with a still small voice today. Amen.




The Paschal Candle during the Transitus



The Franciscan Federation Makes a Home for Associates

The 2022 "Hearts on Fire, Journeying Together" Franciscan Federation Conference made a determined effort to reach out and welcome all those who identify as Franciscans - not just vowed religious, but their associates*, as well as secular Franciscans, lay Franciscans and all those who seek to live out a Franciscan life in today's world, to journey with them toward the future. (*associates, companions, co-journers, affiliates, etc.)



In conjunction with this outreach, a new Life and Mission Committee was formed to focus on programmatic, practical, and mission-driven endeavors that provide the space and opportunity for growth in the Franciscan tradition. Unique to this Commission is a subcommittee structure that supports the three main areas: formation, congregational associates, and emergent ideas. As head of this committee, Margaret Carney, OSF posed this question to Associate Directors: "Could the Franciscan Federation be More Helpful to Associates and their Directors? If yes, How?" A survey was sent to the Associate Directors of Franciscan Congregations and the findings were presented at the conference.

The survey identified six areas of need:

- 1. Assist in making available current, updated materials for initial and ongoing formation of Associates (including materials in Spanish).
- 2. Compile a list of quality Franciscan presenters for retreats, days of reflection and workshops
- 3. Host/Facilitate Zoom calls for Associate Directors on a semi-annual basis
- 4. Promote articles about and by Associates for the Federation newsletter
- 5. Research and share the various possibilities of how Associates can be sustained into the future
- 6. Develop leadership materials to assist Associate Directors on how to facilitate/encourage/promote small group leaders within their own communities.

On November 16th seventeen associates and associate directors met to review this list and choose an area of interest that they felt called to pursue. Six of those participating were Allegany Franciscans: Colleen Brady, osf; Rita Canfield; Linda Dees; Kathy Doyle; Mary Laubenthal, and Cheryl Maggio. Between now and the end of January the six small work groups will meet to come up with some plans to implement their assignments which will be presented to the Life and Mission Committee at their next meeting in early 2023.

This collaboration should provide opportunities to further ignite our Franciscan-Clarian charism and values and space for the emergence of new ideas.

At the end of the meeting, we were asked to give a word that described how we were feeling. Some of the emotions that were vocalized were 'hopeful, energized, motivated, excited.' A very good beginning.
